## Cuddle Bed Donated in Memory of Neville Best

When the family of Neville Best of Fogo Island heard of the need for a Cuddle Bed for patients utilizing palliative care services at Fogo Island Health Centre, they immediately thought of their Uncle and how this specialized bed would've benefited him in his final days. It was because of this that Neville's nephews, Glen & Jerry Best and their families, made the largest single donation Fogo Island Health Centre has ever received for the purchase of a brand new Cuddle Bed.



Neville Best

Neville was the fourth of five children of Mytrice and Thomas Best. He was a Radio Operator that worked mostly with the Bedford Institute of Oceanography aboard the Acadia and finished his career with the CSS Hudson. During his time at sea Neville traveled to many ports all over the world; circumnavigating around North and South America, including the infamous Cape Horn and through the Northwest passage in the Arctic. Occasionally he would tell of his harrowing adventures at sea. Such as the time a wave broke out the window on the bridge of the Hudson (330ft ship) off the coast of Greenland while riding out bad weather, or when their ship recovered six bodies the morning after the Ocean Ranger sank.

Following his retirement in 1987 Neville decided to move back to his hometown of Fogo. During his retirement he would remain an active community volunteer especially with St. Andrew's Church holding various positions and involving himself with the ongoing maintenance of the church and cemeteries. Neville also served on the board of Harbourview Apartments and was actively involved in the operation of the Bleak House museum. He had a passion for genealogy, history and spent many hours reading with his cat Jake by his side.

Glen Best stated, "Although Neville was a very quiet, reserved person he made great contributions to his community and took great pride in giving back. It is for this reason it is only fitting that the newly acquired cuddle bed at the Fogo Island Health Centre be donated in Neville's memory. We hope the bed serves the public well and in times of grieving gives some comfort to families so they may be close to loved ones in their final hours and days. It is our hope that the public will continue to support the ongoing fundraising for the second bed because we feel that every bed should be a cuddle bed." *Individuals can continue to contribute to the Cuddle Bed Fundraiser though the foundation website at www.cnehf.nl.ca*.

# Gander Shriners Support Healthcare

Two generous donations from the Gander Shine Club will benefit our patients in the Orthopaedic Clinic and our OBS Unit at James Paton Memorial Regional Health Centre. The first is a new orthopedic cast saw, which cost \$6,146 and will be used several times a day for removing patient casts. This saw is much quieter than the previous saw, making it more comforting for our younger patients. The second donation of a Thera-Glide Rocker for OBS is a self locking glider rocker which is designed to help reduce the risk of fall and helps provide comfort and stress relief for new and expectant moms during their stay. #### Safe Ambulance Rides thanks to the Gander Rotary Club

With a generous donation from the Gander Rotary Club, our Foundation was able to purchase 21 Kangoofix Neonatal Restraining Devices for regional ambulance services. These devices, which cost, \$15,000 are designed to safely and effectively cradle and secure a newborn during ambulance transportation, allowing the baby to travel with their parent. Not only does this eliminate the need to use two vehicles and



crews for transfers, but it also ensures a safer and improved environment for both mother and baby throughout the journey. Close contact between mother and baby is clinically proven to improve condition of both individuals during transfers. All acute care facilities within our healthcare region are now equipped with these devices, thanks to the generosity of the Gander Rotary Club. The funds necessary to make this purchase was the direct result the Annual Rotary Dinner & Auction held in November of 2019. Since 2006 The Gander Rotary Club have donated over \$54,000 towards healthcare programs and initiatives within our region.

# Giving the Gift of Time to Grieving Families

Thank you to Jennifer Waterman who recently completed her fundraising goal to purchase a new Cuddle Cot for the OBS Department at James Paton Memorial Regional Health Centre in Gander. This cot is currently the only one in use outside of the Janeway in St. John's and since the arrival the need to use it has been frequent. We would like to thank Artist Perry Kieley, who kindly donated a framed print "Headin' South" towards the cause and we would also like to send a very special thank you to the Gander Rotary Club for their generous donation of \$1764 towards this unit. Your kindness is appreciated by all.

### Gander Lions Club Donate for Comfort & Care

## Local CCHA Chapters Benefit Newborn Hearing

Thanks to both the Gander Chapter and the Newfoundland Chapter of the Canadian Hard of Hearing Association, our Speech & Hearing Department is the grateful recipient of a new Otoacoustic Emissions Screener. This new portable screening instrument (Corti), which cost \$7,200, provides rapid measurement and documentation of Distortion Product Otoacoustic Emissions (DPOAEs) at several frequencies. DPOAEs are acoustic signals the CORTI

detects in the ear canal of a newborn baby. The presence of these DPOAEs or lack thereof tells us if the baby has normal hair cell function in turn normal hearing. Knowing this result within the first few days of life, allows our Audiologists and Midwives the opportunity to facilitate the appropriate rehab during the all important stages of early childhood speech and language acquisition. Since 2003, both branches of the Canadian Hard of Hearing Association have donated over \$32,000 towards hearing initiatives in our region.
